

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General Ed Assessment: Wellness/Sport Sciences

Editor's Note: This is another in a series of Exchange articles on assessment initiatives at Millerville. Coordinated by the office of the Assistant Provost for Planning and Assessment, submissions are by MU faculty

Faculty members of the Department of Wellness and Sport Sciences have recognized the usefulness of outcomes assessment as a tool that provides evidence of instructional effectiveness. This became most evident to us as we began to assess the impact of the required general education class, Wellness - Concepts for Health and Fitness. In an effort to curb the increasing incidence of obesity, heart disease, and other health-related behaviors, and to show students how to take responsibility for their own health, undergraduates at MU are required to pass this three-credit course. The wellness and sport sciences faculty established a standing assessment committee to address the actual impact this class has on our students. Under the direction of Dr. Julie Lombardi, associate professor of wellness and sport sciences, the General Education/Outcomes Assessment Committee meets regularly and recently developed a pretest-post-test assessment instrument. According to the Middle States Association, this methodology is considered a "direct format" for assessing student learning. Other direct formats include standardized tests, case study analysis, and rubrics.

The Committee used a modified Delphi technique for selecting questions for the test. In short, the Delphi technique is a method for obtaining a consensus from a panel of experts. Each expert selected is required to review and offer comments on the appropriateness of the test items, phraseology, and format. Results from a dependent t-test revealed a significant difference (p<.001) between the pretest and post-test pilot scores during the spring 2003 semester. In other words, students increased their knowledge. Currently, the Committee is developing several questions designed to assess student wellness behaviors as part of an annual survey administered by the Elsie S. Shenk Wellness & Women's Center.

MU's combined full- and part-time undergraduate and graduate enrollment last fall totaled 7,861 students, 211 more than 2002's official fall tally.

Included were 6,820 undergraduates, of whom 6,143 were full time and 677 part time, and 1,041 graduate students, including 210 full time and 831 part time.

Full-time undergraduates increased by 234 over the fall 2002 total, while full-time graduate students increased by 38 people.
