Tips for Online Schooling Success

1. Treat Your Classes Like an In-Person Course

One of the very best strategies you can use to approach your online education is to treat it just like you would an in-person class. Watch class videos and complete all coursework promptly, rather than waiting until the last minute. Pay close attention to deadlines and follow the syllabus closely you don't have the in-person structure that provides these kinds of reminders, so you have to take responsibility for that yourself. Additionally, interacting and participating in as many course-related activities can be very beneficial and help boost your learning experience.

2. Create a Dedicated Study Space &

Anyone working from home can tell you they are more productive when they have a designated office and workspace. The same holds true for students learning at home. Your study space area should be free of distractions and have everything you need to study and complete coursework.

Then, when you are done with schoolwork, you can walk away until the next day. Having a separate space that you use every day only for schoolwork can help you tune in for work each day.

It's a good idea to have specific markers for study time—dedicated space is one of those markers. But also try small habits, rituals, or routines that you do before you get to work, much like you would when preparing for a day of in-person classes. For example, you could change out of your pajamas, wash your face, and light a scented candle before you start your schoolwork. Define your space and time between class and the rest of your life.

3. Eliminate Distractions

In addition to creating a designated study space, get rid of distractions,

including everything from social media to movies and new video games to others in the home. This can be more challenging for some, but the more you can eliminate those distractions, the more you can focus on your studies.

4. Find a Virtual Study Group

Get to know your classmates and see if there are any virtual study groups. If not, work with other students and create one. Additionally, the school or a school counselor can help get you in contact with other students who have a study group established. Having other people to study with can help keep you accountable, and make the learning experience more enjoyable.

It's especially important for online students to seek out opportunities to engage with other students, as it can be isolating if you are doing it all on your own. Study groups are a great way to socialize and get help when you need it.

Meet the Writing Coordinator

What is your name and title?

Dr. A Nicole Pfannenstiel, Associate Professor of Digital Media. I work in English & World Languages Department.

How long have you been at MU?

The 2024-2025 Academic Year is my 9th at Millersville University!

Can you tell us about your family?

My husband and I are originally from Arizona. I was born and raised in the Phoenix area, my husband moved to Flagstaff when he was 9. We attended Northern Arizona University as undergraduates, then I completed all my graduate work at Arizona State University. We have one son, Marshall. He started 7th grade this year. He is a huge fan of all things manga and Pokémon. We travel back to Arizona once every other year to visit our parents. We also have siblings in California, Arizona, Colorado, and Florida.

What do you enjoy doing outside of

When the weather is nice, I really enjoy gardening. I have tomatoes, cucumbers, blueberries, strawberries, pepper, and rose bushes. I also have tons of houseplants. Most of my plants are typical houseplants, but I do have a few herbs indoors as well. I really like a combination of decorative and food. I want to try winter tomatoes in a sun room - this will be my grand experiment this winter. In addition to gardening, I am an avid reader. I finish anywhere from 80 to 100 books a year. This is helped by my son's schedule of piano lessons and sports camps - I read while I watch or wait. Finally, I love to knit and craft. I'm working on winter hats since the cooler weather is coming. But I also love to make jewelry and decorative items.

How did you get interested in English & Writing and teaching it?

I started graduate school as a nondegree student, taking classes to decide what I wanted to study for my Master's. My undergraduate degrees are in Psychology and Communications - so I completed a graduate course in Rhetorical Theory. While I loved rhetorical theory, the communication approach didn't quite fit for me, I felt a bit disconnected from the findings and research focuses. I

then completed an English class in Pop Culture, which drew from rhetorical theory to understand how we use writing to build and share culture. I was hooked. I knew from that class, I wanted to apply to the English MA program.

In Rhetoric and Composition programs, the theories typically involve first year writing classes and first year writing programs. There is always a teaching component - but it's mixed with general education, accreditation assessment, and shared assignments to support learning to write. As I learned these theories, I wanted to practice teaching so I took a job working for the IQ Abacus Math & Language School, teaching Saturday cram school classes to K-6th graders. The owners felt my high energy levels would be really supportive of the kindergartners enrolled in their Saturday school, so I started with a l hours class of Kindergartners and a l hours class of 4th graders. It was amazing, the kids were amazing. I learned so much about what writing growth looks like in learners. Working with kids for over 4 years taught me so much about teaching.

I moved on to teach at a community college while I finished my doctoral degree. I first taught online at Mesa Community College about 15 years ago. There are so many important ways community colleges support their communities - providing access to affordable education, with a variety of class formats and class offerings to meet learner needs. I fell in love with online teaching working with community college students. This work influenced my dissertation topic, I wrote about and researched

online composition course design. TL;DR it started with a not-quite-rightfitting rhetoric class, included teaching 5 year olds, and grew into a dissertation topic at a community college!

What do you like about working with the Online Writing students?

I like that online courses provide access to students on their schedules, and allows students to take classes that suit their needs. I was a double major in my undergrad, walking a mile in 15 minutes to get between classes so I could fulfill all my requirements. I loved school - but balancing the courses with a spread out campus and a work schedule was a lot. Today, students can reduce some of that stress with course scheduling by including an online course. Every semester I see students that are grateful for the ways they can fit the online course into their lives, to meet their graduation needs.

Do you have any advice for our online students?

I highly recommend all online students reach out to their advisor and faculty members with basic introductions. It doesn't have to be anything huge, but share something about yourself with us. When we see opportunities like scholarships, grants, and funding cross our desk - we then know who to make aware of those opportunities. This is one of my favorite things about MU - we have a lot of opportunities for students. When we know our students, we can connect them with so many amazing experiences to enrich their undergraduate experience. All it takes is an email!
